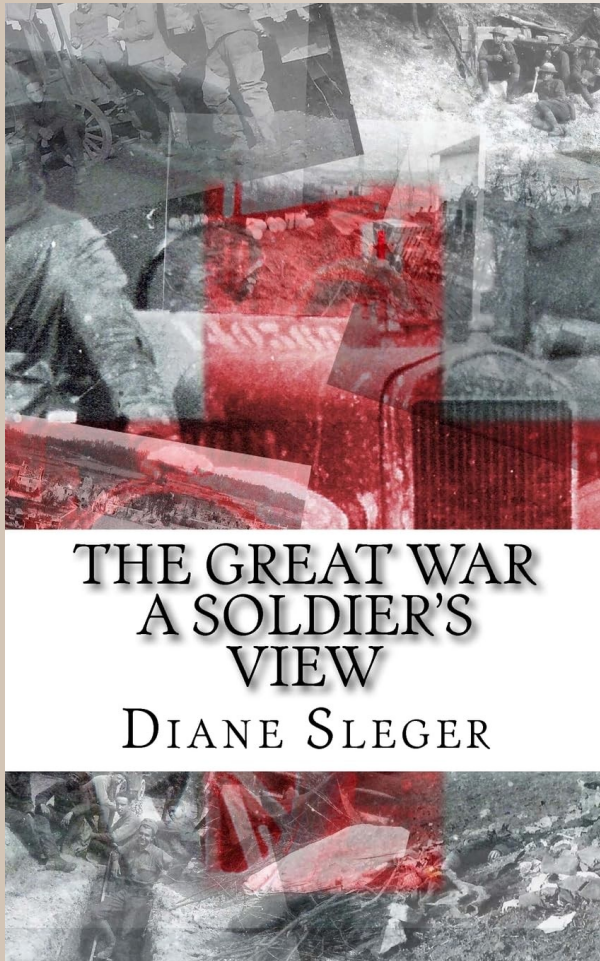
ONE LUCKY COMBAT INFANTRYMAN
